Gydance acts on what she hears, volunteering regularly with **Second Harvest** to address food insecurity. Spokane Colleges Head Start & ECEAP

Spokane Colleges Head Start & ECEAP partners closely with NECC/ZONE to support children and families in Northeast Spokane. NECC/ZONE recently became a Community Representative on the **Head Start Policy Council**, strengthening local collaboration. Family Services Coordinators frequently visit the ZONE to **connect families with resources**, share program flyers, and encourage families to participate in community events. Through these efforts, Head Start & ECEAP help families access educational programs, wellness opportunities, and neighborhood activities, **building stronger connections and fostering a supportive, engaged community across Northeast Spokane.**

If You Could Save Just One

If You Can Save Just One is a youth serving non-profit creating a safe, engaging third space for youth to feel seen, valued, and supported, while exploring their potential and building community. Located within the **Hillyard Neighborhood**, Just One has been a ZONE partner from its inception, engaging youth furthest from opportunity through mentorship and **after-school/summer programming** activities for youth and their families. Just One also provides local resources and support for parents and caregivers, navigating community programs in Spokane.

2025 Bank of America Neighborhood Builder



NECC/The ZONE was recognized as the 2025 Bank of America Neighborhood Builder. This designation comes at a meaningful moment during our leadership transition, providing access to **leadership development** and a **national peer network of nonprofit leaders**, along with resources that help us continue supporting families, youth, and neighborhoods across Northeast Spokane.

We are grateful to Bank of America for investing in our community and helping NECC/The ZONE continue its work in **workforce training, youth development, and neighborhood engagement**.

Jeans Beans is Open!



Our Jean's Beans Coffee Shop (named after Jean Farmer) is now open, offering hands-on training and work experience through a partnership with **Career Path Services**. The shop was launched under the leadership of **Amanda Randall**, a dedicated case manager with The ZONE for the past two years, whose welcoming personality and commitment to mentorship created a strong foundation for participants. In 2025, we welcomed our first four individuals into the program. One participant, Beth, has since transitioned into a leadership role as the coffee shop manager, demonstrating the program's impact in **developing skills, growing confidence, and building career pathways**.

Spotlight: Nourishing Our Neighbors



NECC works year-round to ensure families and seniors in Northeast Spokane have access to food. In September, our **Beef Counts** distribution with **Second Harvest** and the WA State Beef Commission provided **12,473 meals**.

Twice a week, donations from WinCo and Costco help support local seniors, beyond the hot lunch provided by HSC. We also partner with the **Hillyard Community Campus** and Second Harvest, running weekly distributions at rotating schools, and when the schools are unable to host, NECC/ZONE steps in to keep food available for the community. Through these efforts we help reduce food insecurity and keep Northeast Spokane nourished.

Creating Space for Families

Family Nights, co-hosted with the **NEST Coalition**, welcomed nearly 400 participants engaged across three events, offering hands-on activities, shared meals provided by **NEWTech Prep**, and opportunities for families to connect. Generous partners and volunteers helped make each night special.

Paint & Snack



Families explored their creativity with canvases and paints, while laughing, sharing ideas, and proudly showing off their finished artwork. By the end of the night, families left with painted creations and shared memories of time spent together.

Garden Party



Families planted seeds and received starter plants from WSU Snap-Ed, while enjoying crafts and outdoor activities like axe throwing hosted by Special Mobility Services. Volunteers from the Junior League of Spokane supported activities, helping families create something to grow at home and connect with their neighbors.

Pajama Party



The largest Family Night featured crafts, games, and treats. Every child received a toy, plushy, toothbrush and filled goodie bag, thanks to Bank of America, Christ Our King Church, Embrace Washington, Project Beauty Share, and NEST, while families celebrated together in a festive, fun-filled evening.

Growing Community Connections

Once a month during the market season, NECC/ZONE hosted boosted Street Fairs sponsored by **Wellpoint** during the **Hillyard Farmer's Market**, bringing neighbors together with **activities, legal aid, resources, and food**. In 2025, events included **Kickstart to Summer**, an **Employment and Education Market** with a firetruck and Italian sodas in ZONE Color Changing Cups, a **Back to School Fair** distributing over 10,000 **school supplies** and offering **health services**, and **School & Beyond**, featuring a space-themed scavenger hunt and giveaways. Legal aid from **Inland Empire Legal Aid** or the **Sandy Williams Justice Center** was available at each event. On average, **355 residents attended** each fair, connecting with community partners and enjoying hands-on fun. Thank you **URM** for keeping neighbors hydrated at all of these hot events.



Youth Wellness

The Youth Wellness Zone (YWZ) is a student-driven initiative centering youth voice as its guiding force to strengthen collective responsibility for youth wellness. The YWZ model aligns partners and leverages deep neighborhood engagement with youth driven strategies to promote youth mental health and wellness locally in both the built and social environments.

Chase Youth Awards



The YWZ students won the **Environmental Champion Teen Group Award** for their research and advocacy on climate change. **Wednesday Adams** received the **Judges' Choice Individual Award** for her outstanding advocacy in youth mental health.



From Classroom to Capitol

Youth-led means students **name the problems, design the solutions,** and **lead outreach** to gather community, business, and lawmaker support. While our OTA Wellness class may not have realized where this would lead—they took a breath, prepared their thoughts, got in the van, and drove to present to legislators on the **Senate Human Needs committee**. For 20 minutes, they shared priorities, including how important funding **988** is for suicide prevention, **support for reducing wildfire risk,** and how **accessible parks** positively impact **youth mental and physical health**. Students then went from legislative office to legislative office, holding meetings with legislators to share how they can contribute to our state's youth wellness.

Schoolyard Forest



The On Track Academy schoolyard forest on the Hillyard Community Campus is officially open to encourage forest bathing. Students found that being outside lowers heart rate, blood pressure, and stress.

Zilch Distribution



YWZ students distributed fresh produce from Second Harvest every other week during the school year and through the summer, providing healthy food to peers, families, and seniors while reducing food waste.

Showcases

Students showcased their work at City Hall, **connecting with the mayor, city council members, and community leaders.** They shared their perspectives on the issues that matter most to them, sparking meaningful conversations about **youth priorities and community needs.**

They also led a session at the **End the Violence Conference** sponsored by **SRDVC**, focusing on mental health awareness and strategies to support themselves and their peers.






Meet Cassie

In the Essential Skills class, Cassie included a story about a lifelong mentor in her final I AM Poem presentation, reflecting on her growth and insights:

"She saw a woman worth saving long before I believed she existed. Today, I am still fighting to become the person she always knew I could be, and I'm only standing because she chose to be the anchor when I was drifting away."

At graduation, she shared her I AM Poem with this teacher in the audience—alongside her own children—celebrating her growth.

Emily Shiraishi, facilitator of the Essential Skills program, noted: “From the first day of Essential Skills, Cassie showed up authentically and invested in every part of the class. Even in moments that required vulnerability, she stepped into her power—not only for herself, but for her family.” Through the program, she strengthened her **emotional intelligence, confidence, relationship-building, parenting skills, and career readiness.**

Since completing the program, she has continued her journey through **The ZONE Economic Mobility Case Management**, gaining employment as a **Crisis Response Peer Specialist**, and has now been elected **President of the Head Start Policy Council.** Cassie reflects the power of mentorship and skill-building to help women grow in their careers, families, and communities.

24/7 Dad Class

Through partnership with the **Spokane Fatherhood Initiative**, more than 30 families experienced the impact of a **loving, present father** this year.

Fathers overcoming homelessness, isolation, and deeply difficult moments found **stability, connection, and renewed purpose**, strengthening not only themselves, but their families and the NE Spokane community at the Northeast Community Center/ZONE.



Economic Mobility

This year, The ZONE launched the Economic Mobility Program, following our successful Housing Stability Program. The mission is to foster **financial mobility, independence, and confidence** through comprehensive support services, including: employment supports, education supports, benefits cliff navigation, financial coaching, peer support & advocacy, and wrap-around case management.

Two Generations, One Journey



Erika Barba Laredo and her daughter **Daniela Garcia** exemplify the **multigenerational impact** of The ZONE. Through personalized case management, programs, and community connections, both have grown in **stability, leadership, and opportunity**, while also giving back to Northeast Spokane.

Erika began her journey with The ZONE by enrolling in the Essential Skills class, recommended by her case manager, Lavonnie. **“I have seen myself grow thanks to my case manager believing in me,” Erika shared. “The Life Skills Class really changed my career and what I wanted to do in life.”** Through ongoing case management, The ZONE supported Erika in achieving employment at **Spokane Neighborhood Action Partners (SNAP)**, navigating personal challenges, including a medically necessary surgery, and pursuing professional growth, along with completing a **Certification as a Medical Interpreter**.

Building on her mother’s momentum, Daniela, a single mother with **entrepreneurial vision**, pursued opening a dessert mini-pancake food trailer. With guidance from The ZONE and partner **Safety Net Inland Northwest**, she navigated permits, business planning, and renovations. Her trailer will debut in 2026 at the Northeast Community Center as a launch spot, creating a joyful gathering spot and financial independence for her family. **Daniela shared, “This journey has strengthened my belief in my abilities, taught me to overcome challenges, and motivated me to continue working toward building a better future for myself and my family.**

Both Erika and Daniela now serve on **The ZONE Resident Steering Committee**, lending their lived experiences to shape programs while gaining access to trainings, certificate programs, and community connections.

More Than a First Job

For many **youth 16+**, employment isn't just about extra spending money, it's about helping support their families. Some contribute financially to household expenses, while others balance work with caring for younger siblings.

With limited job options, many young people struggle to find employers willing to invest in emerging professionals. Our Economic Mobility team helps bridge that gap, **connecting youth to supportive, responsible workplaces** while **prioritizing education** and building the skills and confidence that **create long-term stability**.

Meet Neddy

When Neddy shared her dream of becoming an ironworker, The ZONE walked alongside her every step of the way- through case management and connection to a rigorous pre-apprenticeship program. In partnership with **Construct a Career**, she gained **hands-on training** in welding, structural ironwork, and safety. It opened the door to a pathway that offers long-term stability and opportunity.

Neddy approached the program with determination and resilience, becoming the first graduate of her cohort with **Iron Workers Local 14** and the only woman to complete it. Her hard work paid off; she is now employed as an ironworker, earning \$10 more per hour than in her previous job.

While she was completing the program, The ZONE provided targeted support to help her family remain stable. Assistance with housing, essential expenses, and transportation ensured she could **focus fully on training without the weight of an immediate financial crisis**. That stability made it possible for her to stay committed to the program and complete it successfully. Today, Neddy and her family are building a stronger future with renewed confidence.

Youth Programming

Through ZONE partner programs, after-school activities, summer adventures, and family events like school carnivals, students find **connection, confidence, and reasons to show up for school and each other**. They try new skills, build friendships, and discover passions that make learning feel more engaging and possible. These programs give every student a chance to feel supported and seen.

Embedded staff in 11 ZONE schools, through partnerships with Spokane Public Schools and Communities in Schools, provide mentorship and lead programs for students and families. As site-based resource navigators, they also connect students and families to ZONE programming and events. Students engaged in this after-school programming have **fewer** behavioral incidents in school, **increased** social-emotional scores (growth mindset and self-management), and **improved** attendance compared to peers. The ZONE also supports youth programming through community-based organizations, and with both models, provided **208,192 hours of programming** this year.

What does it mean to be a ZONE Kid?

Hayley began attending ZONE-funded summer programs at **Regal Elementary** in 2017 alongside her siblings, and remained connected through high school with support from ZONE partners like **Slingshot** and **College Success Foundation**. Hayley graduated from Rogers High School with **strong grades, involvement in sports, and big dreams for her future**.

Through **QuestBridge**, she became one of just 8% of applicants nationwide to earn a **full-ride scholarship to Wellesley College in Massachusetts**. Having never left our community or been on a plane, The ZONE funded travel for Hayley and her dad to visit campus for the first time and get familiar with the area. Now in her first year of college, Hayley is navigating life independently – managing classes, building community, and mastering public transportation in a new city. **Being a ZONE kid means growing up with support, and knowing it doesn't end at graduation.**



Manzanita House



Manzanita House offers **year-round Spanish, Arabic, and Pashto/Dari Heritage Language Programs** at the Northeast Community Center, giving kids a safe space to connect with their language, culture, and peers. The classes help children continue their parents' first language, strengthen family connections, and celebrate cultural heritage. Mothers can join **Women's Teatimes** at the same time, creating a shared community experience.





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
